# Framing and Overview of the Workshop

The USAID Policy LINK<sup>1</sup> Project implemented by DAI Global, LLC has a global mandate to promote resilience and strengthen agriculture policy systems and institutions. In South Sudan, Policy LINK promotes collaborative governance, facilitative leadership, evidence-based decision-making, and the convergence of community and donor resources in the USAID Resilience Focus Zone (RFZ) areas of Akobo, Budi, Jur River, Kapoeta North, and Wau Counties.

Between August 2021 and June 2022, Policy LINK conducted a series of activities designed to build community-led resilience in Jur River County.<sup>2</sup> The activities included a community mapping exercise, sense-making workshops at the *payam* and county levels, bottom-up local action planning workshops, and a joint work planning workshop with community delegates and USAID implementing partners (IPs) active in the county.

Through the workshops, stakeholders developed a coherent county action plan for Jur River and an initial joint work plan that can guide the work of USAID IPs, communities, and local government. These flexible documents can be enhanced and expanded, as needed, to achieve the aspirations of community-led resilience.

Between June 14-15, 2022, community delegates, local and state government officials, and USAID IPs developed a joint county-level feedback strategy. The strategy will guide delegates as they raise awareness of and build support for community-led resilience plans among Jur River residents. This report describes the June 2022 workshop as well as the key messages developed and the platforms for disseminating those messages.

# **Participation**

This community feedback strategy workshop was attended by the same delegates (selected by the community) who participated in the county-level action planning and joint work planning workshops convened by Policy LINK in Jur River County. Six delegates and one representative from the *payam* community development committee (CDC) represented each of the six *payams*, for a total of 42 delegates. In addition, Policy LINK invited all the County Departmental Directors and the County Commissioner as well as the previous delegates from the state line ministries, directorates, and commissions (e.g., from the ministries of agriculture, gender, child and social welfare, animal resources, tourism, cooperatives and rural development, and local government); members of law enforcement and police commissioners; the Commissioner of the Relief and Rehabilitation Commission (RRC); the National Bureau of Statistics Commissioner; and the directorate of the fire brigade.

Figure I shows the gender distribution of participants.




Figure 1. Gender Distribution – Jur River Community Feedback Workshop – June 2022

#### **USAID** Implementing Partner Participation

Five USAID IPs attended the community feedback strategy workshop: (1) DT Global (Shejeh Salam project), (2) the Agency for Technical Cooperation and Development (ACTED), (3) the Danish Refugee Council (DRC), (4) DAI (Resilience Through Agriculture in South Sudan project or RASS), and (5) Integrity Global (Monitoring, Evaluation, and Learning Support or MELS program). The total number of IP participants was 12.

# **Methodology**

To encourage active participation, Policy LINK used the following methodology:

#### **Framing**

At the beginning of each workshop session, the facilitator framed the session's objectives to prepare participants for active, insightful deliberations in group discussions and question-and-answer sessions.

#### **Thematic Group Presentations**

This session provided a platform for each thematic (shock) and constituency (payam, county, and state delegates) group to develop key messages and outreach strategies. Groups presented their plans at the plenary session for refinement and endorsement by other participants.

#### **Feedback Group Simulation Practice**

During this session, each group selected community feedback presenters to convey the agreed-upon messages. The presenters practiced delivering key messages, while other session participants acted as forum representatives and offered feedback.

# **Workshop Objectives**

#### **Overall Objective**

• To continue building momentum toward effective collaboration between the citizens of Jur River County and USAID IPs by helping communities understand community-led resilience.

#### **Sub-Objectives**

- Develop simple, easy-to-understand thematic messages that can be effectively delivered through existing community forums.
- Identify existing community forums through which to deliver key messages.

# **Workshop Format and Outputs**

#### Framing the Workshop

After welcoming the participants, Policy LINK invited Pastor Joseph Lual to open the workshop with a prayer. Then, the facilitator introduced the workshop objective: to collaboratively develop key messages on community-led resilience and a strategy and plan for sharing those messages with Jur River residents who were unable to participate in previous workshops.

#### **Opening Remarks**

The Director General of the Ministry of Local Government opened the workshop on behalf of the Minister of Local Government and Law Enforcement, Honorable Ibrahim Surur Ibrahim. He then welcomed the delegates, encouraging them to be attentive and active during the workshop for the benefit of the communities they were representing.

#### Day I

Over four sessions, six mixed groups of community delegates, CDC representatives, county officials, state line ministry delegates, and USAID IPs discussed resilience concepts and developed key messages. Points of discussion included defining resilience and community-led resilience, shifting mindsets, envisioning a better future, and fostering community ownership, responsibility, and resource commitments. The delegates carefully considered each topic, then proposed messages around each thematic area. Each group then presented the messages to the plenary session for critique and endorsement.

## Day 2

Sessions on the second day focused on developing key messages on the most impactful shocks and stressors (see Table I for a summary). *Payam* delegates were grouped by *payam*; IPs, county officials, and state line representatives had their own groups. Together, participants identified existing forums through which to convey the key messages. Finally, the groups selected a few representatives to practice how messages could be delivered effectively.
